# English: American Pronunciation 

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$/ \varepsilon /$ pronunciation


- Open your mouth a little more for $/ \varepsilon$ /
- / $\varepsilon$ / is a short, relaxed sound.

Examples / $\varepsilon$ /
pen, bell, checks, rest, spell

## /ey/

## /ey/ pronunciation



- Close your mouth a little for /ey/
- /ey/ is a long sound.
- Spread your lips and move your tongue up a little as you say it.


## Examples $/ \varepsilon / \times /$ ey/

pen $\times$ pain, wet $\times$ wait, test $\times$ taste, pepper $\times$ paper, shed $\times$ shade

## |æ/

$/ æ /$ pronunciation


- Open your mouth a little more for /æ/ than for / $\varepsilon$ /.

Examples $/ \varepsilon / \times / æ /$
$X$ (letter) $\times$ axe, pen $\times$ pan, men $\times$ man, left $\times$ laughed, said $\times$ sad

## /^/

## $/ \wedge /$ pronunciation

- Close your mouth a little
 for / $\wedge /$.
- Your tongue should rest in the middle of your mouth.
- / $\wedge$ / is a short, relaxed sound.


## Examples $/ æ / \times / \wedge /$

cap $\times$ cup, bag $\times$ bug, cat $\times$ cut, rag $\times$ rug, angle $\times$ uncle

## /ə/ pronunciation



- Practice the sound $/ \wedge /$.
- Make it very short for /ə/.
- The sound of / $\partial /$ is always short and weak.


## Examples / $\partial /$

The sound / $\partial /$ is used in many unstressed syllables and words. The examples below show when to use the sound / $\partial /$. Stressed syllables are in bold. chickən, təmatoes, lettəce, ə bənanə, ə womən, womən

## /ə/

- / / / is the most common vowel sound in English.
- It is used in many unstressed syllables in words.
- It is also used in the weak pronunciation of many short structure words, such as a, an, of and and. These words almost always have a weak pronunciation with the sound $/ \partial /$.


## can and can't

- Can is usually unstressed and has a weak pronunciation when another word follows it in a sentence. The vowel sound is reduced to / $\partial /$.
- Can has a strong pronunciation when it is at the end of a sentence. It has the clear vowel sound /æ/.
- Can't always has a strong pronunciation. It has the clear vowel sound / $\partial /$.


## /ar/

/ar/ pronunciation


- Practice the short sound / $\partial /$.
- Curl the tip of your tongue up and back to say /ər/.
- The sound / $\partial \mathrm{r} /$ is pronounced as one short sound.


## Note

The sound /ər/ will be further explained after the sound /r/.

## /a/ pronunciation



- Practice the sound /æ/.
- Open yout mouth wide for the sound /a/.
- Your tongue should rest in the bottom of your mouth.


## Examples $/ æ / \times / a /$

hat $\times$ hot, cat $\times$ cot, cap $\times$ cop, sack $\times$ sock, ran $\times$ Ron

Examples $/ \wedge / \times / a /$
hut $\times$ hot, cut $\times$ cot, cup $\times$ cop, suck $\times$ sock

## /b/ pronunciation



- Close your lips tight.
- Push air forward in your mouth.
- Open your lips quickly.
- Use your voice to say /b/.

Examples /b/
buy, bear, bill, cab, robe

## /t/ pronunciation



- Put your tongue just behind your top teeth, but do not touch them.
- Push air forward in your mouth.
- Then quickly move your tongue away.
- Do not use your voice.
/d/ pronunciation

- Practice the sound /t/.
- Use your voice to say /d/.

Examples $/ \mathrm{t} / \times / \mathrm{d} /$
time $\times$ dime, tore $\times$ door, try $\times$ dry, write $\times$ ride, cart $\times$ card

## / // pronunciation



- Put the tip of your tongue up and back little to make / $/ /$.
- Push your lips forward a little into a circle.


## Examples / / /

shoe, sheats, shell, shine, leash
$/ \mathrm{t} /$ / pronunciation


- To say / $\mathrm{t} /$ /, begin to make $/ t /$. Then move your tongue back and away from the roof of your mouth as you say /S/.
- Do not use your voice.


## Examples $/ \mathrm{s} / \times / \mathrm{t} \mathrm{f} /$

shop $\times$ chop, sheep $\times$ cheap, ships $\times$ chips, cash $\times$ catch, wash $\times$ watch
/d3/ pronunciation


- Practice the sound $/ \mathrm{t} \int /$.
- Use your voice to say /d3/.

Examples $/ \mathrm{t} \mathrm{f} / \times / \mathrm{d} 3 /$
cheap $\times$ jeep, choke $\times$ joke, cheers $\times$ jeers, $\mathrm{H} \times$ age, batch $\times$ badge

## /f/ pronunciation



- Touch your top teeth with your bottom lip.
- Blow out air between your lip and teeth.
- Do not use your voice.

Examples $/ \mathrm{p} / \times / \mathrm{f} /$
pan $\times$ fan, pull $\times$ full, peel $\times$ feel, copy $\times$ coffee, cup $\times$ cuff

Examples $/ f / \times / v /$
fan $\times$ van, fine $\times$ vine, few $\times$ view, leaf $\times$ leave
/v/ pronunciation


- Touch your top teeth with your bottom lip.
- Blow out air between your lip and teeth.
- Use your voice.

Examples $/ \mathrm{b} / \times / \mathrm{v} /$
ban $\times$ van, $B \times V$, best $\times$ vest, boat $\times$ vote, cabs $\times$ calves

Examples $/ \mathrm{f} / \times / \mathrm{v} /$
fan $\times$ van, fine $\times$ vine, few $\times$ view, leaf $\times$ leave

## /w/

## /w/ pronunciation



- Make your lips round and hard for /w/.
- Quickly relax your lips.


## Examples /v/ $\times / \mathrm{w} /$

V $\times$ we, vet $\times$ wet, vest $\times$ west, vine $\times$ wine, veil $\times$ whale

## / $\theta /$ pronunciation



- Put the tip of your tongue between your front teeth.
- Blow the air between your tongue and top teeth.
- Do not use your voice.


## Examples $/ \mathrm{s} / \times / \theta /$

sick $\times$ thick, sum $\times$ thumb, sink $\times$ think, mouse $\times$ mouth, pass $\times$ path

Examples $/ \mathrm{t} / \times / \theta /$
tie $\times$ thigh, tree $\times$ three, tanks $\times$ thanks, bat $\times$ bath

## / $/$ / pronunciation

- Put the tip of your tongue between your front teeth.
- Blow the air between your tongue and top teeth.
- Use your voice.

Examples /d/ $\times / ð /$ day $\times$ they, dare $\times$ there, doze $\times$ those, breed $\times$ breathe

## Examples /z/ ×/ð/

 closing $\times$ clothing, bays $\times$ bathe, breeze $\times$ breathe
## /m/pronunciation



- Close your lips.
- Blow the air between your tongue and top teeth.
- Use your voice.
- The sound /m/ comes through your nose.


## Examples /m/

make, summer, time, met, small, comes, smart, remember

## /n/ pronunciation



- Put the tip of your tongue on the roof of your mouth just behind your top teeth.
- Do not close your lips.
- Use your voice.
- The sound /n/ comes through your nose.

Examples $/ m / \times / n /$
me $\times$ knee, mail $\times$ nail, mine $\times$ nine, comb $\times$ cone, gum $\times$ gun

## / $\mathrm{h} /$ pronunciation



- Touch the back of the roof of your mouth with the back of your tongue.
- Use your voice.
- The sound / $\mathrm{y} / \mathrm{comes}$ through your nose.


## Examples $/ \mathrm{n} / \times / \mathrm{n} /$

thin $\times$ thing, ban $\times$ bang, ran $\times$ rang, fans $\times$ fangs, wins $\times$ wings

Examples /nk/ $\times / \mathrm{n} /$ think $\times$ thing, bank $\times$ bang, sink $\times$ sing, rink $\times$ ring

## /I/ pronunciation



- Put the tip of your tongue just behind your front teeth.
- Use your voice.
- To make the sound /I/, the air goes over the sides of your tongue and out of your mouth.


## Examples /n/ $\times / \mathrm{I} /$

night $\times$ light, no $\times$ low, nine $\times$ line, connect $\times$ collect, snow $\times$ slow

## /I/ pronunciation

## - /I/ sounds a little

 different at the end of a word or before a consonant.- As you say /I/, raise the back of your tongue toward the roof of your mouth.

Examples /n/ $\times / \mathrm{I} /$
ten $\times$ tell, pin $\times$ pill, bone $\times$ bowl, mine $\times$ mile

## /r/pronunciation



- Turn the tip of your tongue up.
- Do not touch the roof of your mouth with the tip of your tongue.
- Make your lips a little round.

Examples $/ I / \times / r /$
long $\times$ wrong, light $\times$ write, pilot $\times$ pirate, glass $\times$ grass, cloud $\times$ crowd

## /r/ after Vowels

/r/ pronunciation


- To say the sound /r/ after a vowel, curl the tip of your tongue up.
- Do not touch the roof of your mouth with the tip of your tongue.


## Examples $/ \mathrm{I} / \times / \mathrm{r} /$

heel $\times$ hear, pail $\times$ pear, fall $\times$ four, file $\times$ fire, towel $\times$ tower

## /ar/

## /ar/ pronunciation



- Practice the short sound / $\partial /$.
- Curl the tip of your tongueup and back to say / $\partial \mathrm{r} /$.
- The sound / $\partial \mathrm{r} /$ is pronounced as one short sound.


## Examples / $\partial \mathrm{r} /$

The sound /ər/ is used in many unstressed syllables spelled with a vowel $+r$. The examples below show when to use the sound /ər/. Stressed syllables are in bold. waitər, lawyər, actər, portər, farmər, teachər

## /ər/ (stressed)

Stressed / $\partial \mathrm{r} /$ pronunciation

- Practice the short sound $/ \wedge /$.
- Close your mouth a little.
- Curl the tip of your tongue up and back to say /ər/.
- The sound / $\partial \mathrm{r} /$ is pronounced as one sound.

Examples / $\mathrm{rr} /$
fur, stir, burn, hurts, shirt, bird, girl
